

Transition Checklist

What to consider as your son/daughter approaches the age of majority (18)

This document was developed by Transition Coordinators who work in the local public school districts of Oakland County. The resources and agencies listed below are some of the commonly accessed supports available for students and families, some of which may begin while the individual is still in high school. The majority of the information applies to students who continue school-provided special education services as young adults. This list of activities and resources is offered as general information. Details may change frequently and without notice. As a result, families are advised to check the current status with the appropriate agency, program, resource, etc.

Note: Students are encouraged to participate in all transition-related meetings.

Please use the checklist below to guide your son/daughter in the transition process:

• **Financial Planning:** Know how and prepare for financial security. Some public benefits are dependent on individuals with disabilities staying within certain income and asset limits. The options below allow for sheltering funds over the limited amount allowed by Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

O Mi-ABLE:

- The mission of MiABLE is to encourage and assist the saving of private funds to help persons with disabilities cover costs that support their health, independence, and quality of life.
- The MiABLE Disability Savings Program was created to allow individuals with disabilities and their families to save funds for Qualified Disability Expenses that support health, independence, and quality of life without jeopardizing eligibility for necessary federal benefits.

- Supported Decision Making: Supported Decision-Making is an approach that encourages individuals with Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) to make their own life decisions with support from family, friends, and trusted individuals.
- Power of Attorney: A Power of Attorney (POA) is a written authorization to act on another's behalf in legal matters. The person creating a Power of Attorney is known as the "principal," and the person authorized to act is called the "agent."
 - Financial Power of Attorney: Allows the agent to act on behalf of the principal regarding financial decisions
 - **Medical Power of Attorney:** Allows the agent to act on behalf of the principal regarding medical decisions
 - **Durable Power of Attorney:** Allows the agent to act on behalf of the principal regarding financial, medical, and legal decisions
- Guardianship: Guardianship is a court order that allows one person to make decisions for another person. There are two types of adult guardianships in Michigan. The first is for persons described as "legally incapacitated individuals," and the other is specifically for people with intellectual or developmental disabilities. (Michigan law also provides for a "conservatorship"

which is like guardianship except it only gives a person control over another person's property, assets, and money)

- You have rights if someone asks the court to appoint a guardian. If you are under guardianship, you also have the right to ask that the guardianship be changed or terminated.
- Most people with a disability are able to take care of their own lives without a guardian. Because guardianship assigns an individual's rights to another person, pursuing guardianship should be done thoughtfully and with a full understanding of the legal and personal implications. Disability Rights Michigan, The Arc of Oakland County, the Michigan Developmental Disabilities Council, Oakland Community Health Network, and the Developmental Disabilities Institute at Wayne State University recommend the use of alternatives to guardianship.
- Consult the probate court to determine the necessary documentation, such as an updated psychological evaluation, medical report, and other relevant records, as well as the required recency of these reports.

- Medicaid: Complete this application in conjunction with applying for SSI to start the process in order to receive medical benefits, health care coverage, and Community Mental Health services through Oakland Community Health Network (OCHN). It takes approximately one month to become eligible for services. Individuals can dual enroll with third-party private insurance and still be approved for Medicaid.

Oakland Community Health Network (OCHN): People who receive public mental health services
through OCHN's provider network include those who have an intellectual or developmental disability,
mental health challenge, or substance use disorder. The majority of these individuals have Medicaid
insurance coverage. OCHN's goal is to ensure these individuals are aware of and have access to
services and support that will improve their health and quality of life, as well as ensure their
engagement in full community participation.
