

SEASON CONTINUES THIS WEEKEND

To say this has been a successful season for our Boys and Girls Varsity Bowling teams could be a huge understatement.

The adjective VERY needs to be added in front of successful when you talk about the 2022-23 campaign for those two teams.

- → Our Boys Team qualified for the State Finals for the first time since 2010.
- → Our Girls Team qualified for the State Finals for the first time in school history.
- → Our Boys Team finished the regular season ranked No. 2 in the state for Division 3.
- → Both teams went undefeated winning MAC Gold Division league and tournament titles.

When you talk to any competitive bowler it all comes down to this ... hitting your marks and staying focused.

That's something Neys has done consistently at the right moments as she's now qualified for the state finals each of the last two seasons.

"I just need to concentrate," Neys said "Last year I was extremely nervous going to the finals because it was my first time going but now I know what it's all about so I will concentrate more."

Things didn't start out well in practice for Neys last Saturday at Flat Rock Lanes as a few of her shots found their way into the gutter which led to her not having a good feeling about qualifying this year. Then she rolled a 200 in her first game and her confidence level grew from that point. "That made me extremely happy," Neys said. "Then I stayed consistent with my 160s and then I shot a 191 in game five."

Neys added that when the pace of bowling is quick and not dragging her scores are way better.

"I just get in a groove," Neys said. "That leads to strikes, spares and consistently hitting your spot."

Neys placed 55th at last year's finals at JAX 60 in Jackson with a six-game pin all of just 836.

"I just want to finish better than 55th this year," Neys said. "I want to make my coach proud."

Neys said she has not looked at the other qualifying scores heading to the finals because she's only going to focus on her game.

Pickett was dialed in at regionals finishing with a six-game pin count of 1,171 to finish eighth.

"I need to focus on myself," Pickett said. "If I hit my mark they can't beat me. If I'm not missing my mark and picking up the spares I should be fine.

"I'm going to aim high," added Pickett when asked about where he'd like to finish Saturday. "I need at least a 200 each game or better. I'm shooting for top three all the time."

The bowler that won the regional - Blissfield's Blake Terrill - had a 290 in Game 4. To get that total you spare in the first frame and strike out from that point.

"You can't let that get to you," Pickett said. "That was a crazy game. You just need to refocus and try and bowl your own 290 to catch up or do even better."

natural and kind of come to me."

Dudley will perform three, 45-minute sets in The Library at the Detroit Club. Each set will consist of 11 songs followed by a 15-minute break before the next set begins.

"I've had little appearances on a bunch of different things but nothing like what will be happening Friday," Dudley said. "I was only playing a song or two, nothing like being up there for three hours." Dudley's performance will be covers from some of his favorite alternative rock bands, including Nirvana, the Foo Fighters, and Pearl Jam.

"With those songs, they all have some deep meaning and some incredible backstories," Dudley said. "That's what I really love. That's how I want to make music. I want my songs to have meaning and resonate with people and be relatable."

Dudley got assistance from his dad to help form his playlist for the set Friday.

"He's my outside perspective," Dudley said. "He knows what songs will work for the crowd I'm playing in front of."

Dudley is a self-taught musician but does credit local guitarist Sammy Boller for helping him take his talents to a new level with the lessons he was given.

Dudley, who has a couple of original songs he's written a couple of years ago and plans to write more in the near future, has a YouTube channel where he posts a new music video to it every Monday. "It's kind of weird, I was more anxious about the Talent Show but I think that was because the people I was performing in front of I see every day," Dudley said.
